National Immunization Awareness Month


August is National Immunization Awareness Month. National Immunization Awareness Month is an annual observed to highlight the importance of routine vaccinations for people of all ages.



Vaccines are among the most successful and cost-effective public health tools available for preventing disease and death. In the United



States, vaccines have greatly reduced infectious diseases that once routinely caused severe illness and death, including smallpox and polio. School immunization rates provide insight into the vaccine coverage in communities across the state. The map to the right shows the proportion of kindergarten student with an exemption, which includes religious and medical exemptions to at least one of the required vaccines. Across the state, exemption rates and those not meeting school requirements are fairly low. In Worcester County, we have a 1.7% exemption rate, compared to the statewide proportion of 1.4%. In addition, Worcester County has a low rate of kindergarten students not meeting school requirements. This data is based on the 2022-2023 MA School Immunization Survey.
